

First Responder Voter News Making a Safer Memphis

Over 140,000 people sign petition Pledging Support

Officials from the Memphis police and firefighters associations announced they have collected more than 140,000 signatures from citizens calling for a referendum vote to increase the sales tax by one half cent (0.5%) to support the city's first responders.

Beginning in 2014, the City of Memphis instituted massive cuts to the pension and health benefits of police officers and firefighters. As a result hundreds left for jobs in other cities and ultimately it is the citizens who have suffered as the city has become less safe.

In the wake of the cuts the police department lost nearly 500 officers, and not surprisingly crime skyrocketed. In the four years since the cuts despite spending millions on recruitment the City remains hundreds of officers short of the recommended goal of 2480. There has only been a total net gain of 50 officers since 2014.

Since January 1, 2016, the Memphis Fire Department has hired 458 firefighters and dispatchers, during the same time period 256 resigned leaving a net positive of 202, or 44%. "To keep our citizens safe, we need to be able to recruit and retain quality personnel. It doesn't do much good to recruit potential firefighters if they leave due to devastating cuts to pensions and health care they were promised," stated Thomas Malone, President of the Memphis **Fire Fighters** Association. The Memphis Fire

Fighters Association and the Memphis Police Association concluded that the fairest and most feasible way of effectively addressing this growing crisis would involve increasing the local sales tax by one half cent (0.5%). Memphis is the only city in Shelby County that has not taken advantage of this opportunity. The cities of Arlington, Bartlett, Collierville, Germantown, Lakeland, and

Millington have all held referendums and opted to levy the half cent increase (0.5%) which has generated millions of dollars for the benefit of their communities. Given that millions visit Memphis each month and use city services it seems only fair that they share in ensuring the safety of Memphis. Mike Williams,

When Promises Aren't Kept—One Memphis Fireman's Long Road to Recovery



There is never a typical day for a Memphis Firefighter, but some days will be remembered forever. Sixteen years ago around 5am, the call came in for a vacant house fire that would require several fire crews to respond. When called, the members of each station throw on their gear, race to their vehicles, and multiple units converge on the inferno, not knowing how many people's

lives are in danger or how many could be hurt, or worse.

The unimaginable came that day and Memphis first responders would end up having to apply all their life saving skills to eight of their own. Not realizing they were on a collision course, Engine 8 and Ladder Truck 3 were converging on the scene when tragedy struck, the two 20ton vehicles collided, seriously injuring

several firefighters, two critically, including Lt. Dennis Lorenz. With broken bones in

his leg, Lorenz would require surgery and doctors were not sure if the limb could be saved. Over the next year, Lorenz would prove them wrong but at a price.

Though the accident happened in 2003, Dennis Lorenz would stay on the job for 10 more years, retiring in 2014 after 29 years of service. Then the city changed the rules regarding his health care, not keeping their commitment made when he became a Memphis Firefighter in 1985. Originally the City and first responders agreed to split the cost of health

When you step into the voting booth on October 3rd you will see an assortment of candidates running for mayor, city council, and various city offices. All-important choices to be sure. Nevertheless, it is the last issue on



the ballot that could have as much impact on the future of our city as all those candidate races. On the last page of the ballot the voters will find the Referendum: Local Option Sales Tax. This initiative was proposed by the Fire and Police Associations to restore health and retirement benefits that were taken away in 2014 and 2016. Mayors and City Councils love to say they support First Responders. In the end, however, actions speak louder than words and the men and women who risk it all every day for their fellow citizens found themselves left out in the cold facing a bleak and uncertain future.

First Responders are not wired to lose hope when faced with a challenge. The Memphis Police and Firefighter Associations hit the streets and collected more than 140,000 signatures required for a referendum to be placed on the October 3rd ballot that would increase the local sales tax by a ½ penny in order to restore lost benefits. Both associations pledged that any remaining monies would be used on Pot Holes and/or Pre-K, the two most popular issues according to citizens.



Good for them. And now it's time to do our part. Early voting is September 13 to 28 and Election Day is October 3rd. We whole-heartedly urge Memphis voters keep the promises made to those who put their lives on the line every day to protect us and vote "FOR" the Memphis Public Safety Referendum—it's the most important, best, and last vote you will cast in 2019.

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proposition ensures that health care and pensions will be restored to first responders before massive cuts were incurred. Perhaps most importantly it will restore the health care benefits to retirees who were stripped of their health care and far too often are facing premiums that decimate their fixed pension payments." The fire and police associations submitted petitions to the Shelby County Election Commission for verification. The City Charter requires signatures from 10% of the City's approximate 385,000 registered voters to place the referendum on the ballot. The petition was certified to have more than enough signatures to place the issue before voters in the October 3rd City of Memphis election, the referendum will be the last issue on the ballot.

Public Safety, Pre-K, and Potholes

Time and time again, we were told by citizens that in the case of any extra funds generated they would like to see every penny accounted for rather than just handing the city a blank check. The most popular issues on people's minds were **Pot Holes** and **Pre-K**. It didn't take us long to realize that both of these issues are important components of **PUBLIC SAFETY**.

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care with the city paying 70% and the firefighter paying 30%, and the City would continue to honor that payment division for retirees after at least 25 years of service.

In 2014 the City changed the policy regarding first responders' health care, allowing retirees to stay on the City insurance plan but requiring retirees pay 100% of their insurance costs, which in Lorenz's case came to more than \$1100 per month. Then just two years later, the City removed all retirees from City's insurance plan, instead providing \$5,000 annually to a medical savings account and leaving firefighters to find health care coverage on the open market. With previous job-related injuries and pre-existing conditions, the additional costs are financially devastating to some.

Most people do not know that Memphis police and firefighters are not eligible for social security, so there is no replacing the City's cuts to their pensions with social security benefits.

By voting "FOR" the public safety referendum on October 3rd the people of Memphis can restore the original commitment made by the City, retirees will be allowed to return to the City health plan and resume the cost-sharing agreement—making good on the original promise.

"I'm not asking for a handout. I'm just asking the voters to support the referendum, so the City keeps the promise it made to me 34 years ago," noted a hopeful Retired Lt. Dennis Lorenz.
